I doubt I will even master basic conversational Guarani while in Paraguay, but I think it is important to be actively interested in picking up words and phrases. After all this is their land and we are simply settlers and guests on it.

This was not my first solo Christmas overseas. I have spent the holidays in Nicaragua, Chile, United Kingdom, and Spain without family, but this is the first year overseas I put up my own tree! Story to follow.

It is most beautiful in Cree. Listen to it sung by a Plains Cree artist here (yeah right I am gonna share my rendition of it!)
