On our way home we stopped at the Chilean Wool Festival where Ginger got a few samples and we were entertained by a small band with a chinchinera. These are street performers that carry a drum on their backs and they strike them with long drumsticks held backward. There are cymbols on top of the drum and they're attached by a cord to their foot so when they step a certain way with the rhythm it rings out. I was told that there are just a few families here that practice the art and pass it down to their children.

It seems we also have a new drummer at church! Bro Dante is enthusiastic but his reach is currently lacking... No doubt he will grow into it! :) Start 'em early!


