We've now been in Aberdeen for four months and continue holding our weekly Bible studies at Starbucks. Our regular group—Libby, Guessy, Nelson, and Folley—have been a consistent and encouraging time of growth and fellowship.

Recently, we've also connected with three young men from another church, all of whom are newer in their faith. It's been a joy to walk alongside them as they seek to grow in their relationship with God. I know for sure that God has ordained our meeting. One of them, John, is especially hungry for more, and we're excited to see how God continues to work in his life.

We've also been blessed to be involved in ministry in the neighboring town of Elgin with our friends and fellow pastors, the Fyfes. Their friendship and partnership have been a great encouragement as we continue building connections across this region. Speaking of connections, we were greatly blessed by the 'Scotland district ladies department' to host a ladies prayer walk in Aberdeen where over 30 ladies from across Scotland walked and trailled throughout the city of Aberdeen.



We've continued ministering at the church I mentioned in our first newsletter. Melissa recently preached at a ladies' conference there, and I had the opportunity to minister on Father's Day. We're deeply thankful for the favor God has given us there and for the relationships that are steadily growing.

This past month, we participated in another all-night prayer meeting at this church. The respected bishop I have mentioned previously was visiting again, and in the middle of the service, he called me out publicly. He said the Lord had spoken to him—that I was holding back on what I had been sent to deliver to the church in Aberdeen. He handed me the microphone, and under a strong conviction of the Holy Ghost, I knew it was time and I began to preach the essential need for baptism in Jesus' name.



By the Spirit, I declared that at their upcoming camp meeting—where over 400 believers, leaders, and pastors from their organization will gather—we will baptize and rebaptize every willing believer, leader, and pastor in the only saving name of Jesus. The message was received in the moment, though it has not yet been acted upon. Still, we believe the door remains open. There's a clear sense in the spirit of "what must we do with this?" lingering in the hearts of those who heard. We remain grateful that, despite our doctrinal differences, the pastor and leadership continue to receive us with love and openness, allowing us to minister and giving us opportunity to impart truth. Please keep praying with us—for boldness, spiritual clarity, and a continued outpouring of God's truth and power.

As we make disciples and build connections beyond the walls of this church, we continue to stand on the vision God gave me before we ever came to Aberdeen. I've shared it before, but I share it again now—declaring in faith that God is bringing it to pass.

Before we left Canada, I saw a vision of a Filipino man who would be the key to an open door in a city I knew nothing about. I know that man is Pastor Sam—the Filipino pastor of a congregation here that has been fasting and praying for revival. I do not believe this is a coincidence, but a divine appointment.
